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Overall Expectations

Application: compare some significant traditions and celebrations among diverse groups and at different times, and identify some of the reasons for changes in these traditions/celebrations.

Inquiry: use the social studies inquiry process to investigate some of the past and present traditions and celebrations within their own family and the communities to which they belong.

Understanding Context: describe some of the major groups in their community, including different types of families, and some of the ways in which traditions and heritage are passed on by such groups.

Big Ideas

Understanding the diversity that exists among families and within the local community leads to an appreciation of diverse perceptives.

The traditions that we celebrate today have developed over the generations.
Canada is made up of various communities that have diverse traditions and celebrations.

Framing Questions

How does an understanding of unique individuals and groups help us appreciate the diversity in our community?

Why is it important to have an understanding of your family's past?

Why should we respect the diverse cultures and traditions in the communities in which we live?

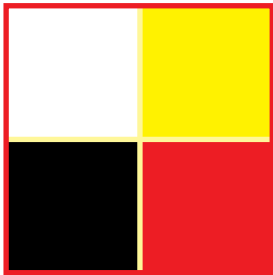
Background Information

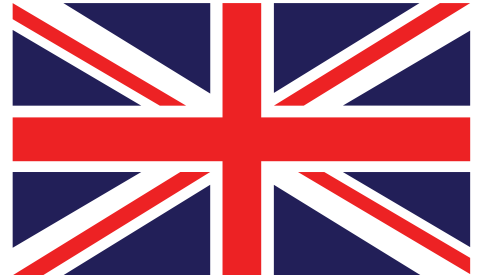
